
ISD Why? for Equity and Family Engagement

- Our district is very diverse. Our changing demographics require us to be culturally responsive.
- Approximately 4000 students had a Home Language other than English (2018) – over 82 different languages
- 24 different preferred languages of communication for families in the ISD (about 900 students)

Languages Spoken in the ISD





Equality vs Equity

Equity: Addresses differences and takes into consideration that society has not always given equal treatment to different groups and every group has not had equal ACCESS to opportunities. Equity is treating people differently based on what they need.

Family and Community Engagement (EL-16)

 Promote an environment and culture that supports and encourages effective engagement of all families, including those from diverse backgrounds

How do we do this?

- Professional development Cultural understanding and Family Engagement
- Parent Panel Listening sessions at schools to hear from families (their experiences, challenges and perspectives)
- Use of interpreters and translated documents
- <u>Family Workshops</u> (Canvas, EVP, Parent Teacher conferences, HS college financial aid)
- Family Information nights (Transition nights, Tips and Resources for families)
- Family Partnership Advisory group
- Partnership with PTSA, Cultural Bridges, The Circle and other community groups
- Provide presentation and video resources in English, Spanish and Chinese
- Religious and cultural celebration calendar

Family Partnership Liaisons

- Liaison assigned to feed pattern (Issaquah, Skyline, Liberty)
- Online Enrollment Verification (August)
- New family registration to ISD
- Questions regarding sports, lunch, fees, and other general support to navigate the school system
- Family issues impacting student learning community resources
- Parents contact liaisons or liaisons reach out to new families or to families the school has identified that may need additional support
- Principals and Teachers can reach out to liaison if they need support in communicating with a family (help with language line)



Supports from School for families

- One on one help to complete registration, EVP, other forms (Free and Reduced lunch, sport forms, etc)
- Workshops to learn how to use technology to access student progress – Canvas, Clever, Family Access
- Workshops to help families with Financial Aid for college
- Information night to learn more about schools elementary, middle and high school, Running Start, WANIC, Parent Teacher Conferences
- Connect families with outside resources IFnCB, Circle, Issaquah Community Services, school counselors
- Support to connect with VOICE mentor, school counselor, other staff

Parent needs

- Clothing for family and child larger sizes (middle and high school)
- Families can't drive to food bank (connect with food bank for deliveries)
- Furniture work with circle and PTSA to deliver families furniture and beds
- Legal support undocumented
